



## Strategic Summary

The Catch-Up premium is given to the school to support Year 7 students with below the expected standard attainment at the end of Key Stage 2 in English and/or mathematics. We use the funding directly to accelerate progress in literacy and numeracy and close the attainment gap between them and their peers.

The students in receipt of 'Catch-up Premium' benefitted from a range of interventions to support them in closing gaps in their reading, spelling and/or mathematics and are making some exceptional levels of progress. *(AS At Standard is the expected standard with a score of 100 in the KS2 SATS).*

- 41 students who were not AS in their KS2 English, 30 (73%) made progress in their reading last year.
- 41 students, 27 (66%) made 12 months progress or more in their reading.
- By the end of the academic year, 25 students out of the 41 (61%) had a reading age that was in line with their chronological age or higher.
- By the end of the year, 7 students out of the 41 (17%) had a reading age that was fourteen years or higher.
- 41 students who were not AS in their KS2 English, 34 (83%) made progress in their spelling last year.
- 41 students, 24 (59%) made 12 months progress or more in their spelling.
- By the end of the academic year, 15 students out of 41 (37%) had a spelling age that was in line with their chronological age or higher.
- By the end of the year, 7 students out of the 41 (17%) had a spelling age that was fourteen years or higher.

In mathematics, for the students who were not AS:

58% of those pupils are on track for at least a standard pass (Grade 4)

In English, for the students who were not AS:

84% of those pupils are on track for at least a standard pass (Grade 4)
