Hello and Goodbye,

After 10 years I have come to write my final piece for the newsletter. Firstly, can I thank all those people who have wished me a happy and long retirement.

As I have said previously, it has been privilege to serve as Headteacher at this very special school. I will leave with many happy memories of the pupils, staff and other members of our school and wider community. A stand out memory for me will be the schools Diamond Jubilee celebrations. It was a fantastic day that really brought all our school community together.

As a school community I feel we have coped well with the many changes to the educational landscape in the last 10 years, which as we know have been accompanied by very difficult situations regarding funding. I have found it very unfortunate that the government have seriously failed to be open about the position regarding school funding, despite it being generally accepted that schools and particularly post 16 provision have had a significant real term cut in funding. The significant cuts of around a third to local authority spending have really had an impact on services for young people. Quite rightly, spending on adult and children's social care has been protected, but not fully and it is still underfunded. This means that a greater proportion of cuts fall elsewhere on council services. For instance, the cuts in street lighting times affect the young adults who tend to go out later, particularly at weekends, as does the removal of bus services by 8 o'clock, closure of youth clubs etc. For a wealthy country we seem to have got our priorities wrong. On the positive side there has been an improvement in mental health services for the young, but as always there is more that can be done.

I really do feel that politicians of all parties are letting down young people and our communities at the moment. We can but hope out of the present political mess, comes something better for everybody's future.

It was great that the skies finally cleared and we had some lovely weather for this year's leavers' ball at Hawkstone Park Hotel Golf Club. It was a lovely sunny evening and our pupils did themselves proud. You can see the pictures inside.

Year 10 have just completed their week of work experience. Again, we must thank all the employers who hosted our pupils along with Mrs Smith who completed the organisation in school.

Sports fixtures have been thin on the ground due to the poor weather. We did, however, have some success in the North Shropshire Athletics Championship.

The annual trip to the First World War battlefields, though always emotional, was very much enjoyed by the pupils.

It is not just myself retiring, we also have a small number of other long standing member of staff retiring. Mrs Jones and Mrs Fry from English, Mrs Jones from mathematics and Mrs Pritchard our science technician. We all wish them long and happy retirements.

Year 11 exam results will be available in school from 10 am on Thursday 22nd of August.

Just a reminder, we ask pupils to return in full uniform on the first day, including the correct shoes, and mindful of the usual hair, makeup and jewellery rules. Also, if any pupils are having their ears pierced it should be done at the start of the holidays so the ears will be healed when they return to school, as we would politely remind you that ear-rings are not permitted to be worn in school.

So farewell; I hope you have a great summer. I wish my successor, Dr Jane Tinker, and the school community the very best for the future. Dr Tinker will look forward to welcoming the pupils back to school on Tuesday 3^{rd} September 2019.


Year 9 French Escape Room - La Douane



Whilst, predictably, **Michael Morpurgo's 'Private Peaceful'**, was announced as the overall winner, our firm favourite is still 'Welcome to Nowhere' by joint runner up, Elizabeth Laird. It was well worth going just to listen to the three authors who took to the stage, Sita Brahmachari, Elizabeth Laird and Beverley Naidoo. Similarly, we were hoping that Sally Nichols would win the 2019 CILIP Carnegie Medal Award with 'Things a Bright Girl Can Do'.

This result reflects the growing interest in books written in free verse, a format which, arguably, makes reading more accessible for teenagers and young adults. 

SHROPSHIRE TEENAGE BOOK AWARD 2019



This is a new award sponsored by Concord College in association with the Shropshire School Library Service. We were part of a small group of student librarians and regular library readers selected to attend the award ceremony, having read some of the shortlisted books selected for Years 8, 9 and 10 students.


On arrival, we were very impressed with Concord College and as pupils arrived from other schools, it was interesting to compare the different school uniforms. After a delayed start, we watched video messages from Nicola Morgan ('Positively Teenage') who spoke about mental health and the importance of not dwelling on the things we cannot change and Gill Lewis ('Scarlet Ibis') and Matt Haig ('Notes on a Nervous Planet') who spoke about the inspiration for their writing.



Three of the authors (Sita Brahmachari, Elizabeth Laird and Beverley Naidoo) went onstage and spoke about their lives and their books. All were great story tellers and we were interested to learn about Beverley Naidoo's arrest for her Apartheid protests (set up by the secret police) and the (false) accusation of murder made against Elizabeth Laird.

All three strongly support human rights and protecting the environment from climate change and were very inspirational. Their 'question and answer' session was helpful for those pupils interested in becoming writers.









We were a bit disappointed when 'Private Peaceful' was announced as the winning book, especially as Michael Morpurgo had not sent a message for the Award Ceremony. We felt that Elizabeth Laird's 'Welcome to Nowhere' was a very worthy runner up. We did get to see Shrewsbury's new mayor, Councillor Mr Phil Gillam, as he presented the runner up prize. We then made a hasty exit and arrived back at The Corbet just in time for the bus home!

We enjoyed attending this event and next year we hope there will be a more varied selection of books and if titles are chosen for younger readers that Year 7s are able to participate to make it an even better event. Thank you to Mrs Sale, Mrs Ashton and Mrs Brett for arranging this trip.

Year 8 Maths Challenge

In April, nineteen of the best mathematicians in year 8 were invited to take part in a National Maths Challenge aimed at the top third of pupils nationwide. The results have now arrived in school and all pupils are to be congratulated on how well they did. Over 300,000 pupils took part and certificates are awarded to the highest scoring 40% of participants (6% gold, 13% silver, 21% bronze).

Special congratulations go to Carlito Puente and Emily Dunst, who both had excellent results and finished within the top 8,000 for their age group. This result meant that Carlito and Emily qualified to participate in a further follow on round in which Carlito finished within the top 25%!




Shropshire Parenting Support The highlights for 2018-2019

The last financial year has seen another successful delivery of the Solihull Approach to parents and carers.

Here are some numbers....

- 116 parents and carers have completed a group
- 294 parents and carers have attended one of our clinics
- 734 appointments were attended
- 10 clinic locations across Shropshire can be accessed for appointments
- 745 children benefited from their parents or carers completing a group or attending clinic appointments
- 100% of parents reported an increase in confidence in understanding and managing their child's behaviour, after completing an 'Understanding Your Child' group
- 79% of families contacted 6-9 months after completion of a group said they had continued to maintain or improve on their level of understanding and managing their children's behaviour.
- 7 parents have accessed our new service of Telephone Call Consultations from January to March 2019.



Who do we help?

We support families who live in the Shropshire Council area who have children under 18 years old, with autism/autistic traits (diagnosis is not needed).

Parent training workshops

Courses for parents are held throughout the year at various Shropshire venues and include introductory awareness sessions, programmes with multiple sessions, and workshops on specific topics.

Individual advice and support for parents

Advice sessions are a chance for parents to meet a member of the team face to face, discuss their concerns and receive practical advice. Further support may be available and can be discussed at the advice appointment.

Coffee mornings and support groups

Informal meetings take place in Shrewsbury, Oswestry, Market Drayton Bridgnorth and Shifnal. They are a chance to meet ofhers and share experiences in a supportive environment.

Holiday events

Trips and play sessions for the whole family take place in the school holidays along with workshops for children and young people. All are a chance to meet others and have fun in a supportive environment,
