

I am definitely going to do this myself as a form of art therapy.



It is still proving tricky to get hold of some books so we have challenged ourselves with a selection for the Summer Holidays. Please see below and feel free to participate!







One Moment by Linda Green




The Pure Heart by Trudi Tweedie





Finding Audrey by Sophie Kinsella




Private London by James Patterson







Scars like Wings by Erin Stewart

Hidden Depths by Ann Cleeves






Magpie Murders by Anthony Horowitz
