# **Mrs Brett's Monthly Library Report**

- 1. Click-and-Drop is now working well (see later comments). Having had feedback from my fellow Librarians across the county, I have to say that our post Lockdown Library service is comparing very favourably with other schools.
- 2. Whilst a few of our Librarians have decided to take a holiday from the team, I am delighted to say that we have an active group of 20 (ranging from Year 8 to Year 11). I am very grateful for their enthusiasm which will be evident as you read on...
- 3. Satchel.One is proving an invaluable tool for communicating with our Library users.
- 4. I have received a very positive response to my plea to return Library books borrowed before Lockdown. I have 'written off' 16 books and will be replacing 8 from this year's Library budget. Setting this in context, it is no exaggeration to say that many School Libraries are chasing 100s of overdue books.
- 5. A quick nod to statistics here. In September 2019, our Library Team shelved 1,068 book returns, by comparison, in September 2020, Mrs Brett and Mrs Leach shelved 105 book returns. Heartbreaking.
- 6. Quickly moving on! Year 7 Tutor room visits have proved very successful and it is lovely to see so much enthusiasm for our Library books. I am looking to book more Tutor visits in November.
- 7. More new books have arrived to support National Poetry Day, Black History Month and World Mental Health Day. Please see the list at the back of this newsletter for all new books arriving this month.
- 8. Pupils are continuing to recommend books and I am looking to expand our Graphic Novels (Manga and Marvel).
- 9. With the help of Mrs Leach, I have updated our Quick Reads section for our reluctant readers and have purchased new titles to supplement our existing stock.
- 10. I am starting to process the multiple copy books purchased by Mrs Ashton in support of the Book-et List challenge which pupils will find in their planners.
- 11. Last, but not least, a bumper edition of our Library newsletter!

# Loans, a recap:

Each pupil has their own library account and may borrow up to three books at a time.

The loan period for Library books is three weeks (longer during holidays).

Library books must be returned through the letterbox under our Library noticeboard (next door to student support services).

In these unprecedented times, fines will be waived on overdue books, providing they are returned in the condition in which they were borrowed.














Our click-and-drop service got off to a slow start as we familiarised ourselves with the new process using Satchel.One.

I would definitely recommend this crime novel to students in Year 8 and above.



'The Deathless Girls' is a must read for KS4 lovers of Fantasy Horror but even I have to admit, I found the ending a little underwhelming,

#### Orphans of the Tide by Struan Murray

When a mysterious boy washes in with the tide, the citizens believe he's the Enemy - the god who drowned the world - come again to cause untold chaos. Only Ellie, a fearless young inventor living in a workshop crammed with curiosities, believes he is innocent. The Enemy can take possession of any human body and the ruthless Inquisition are determined to destroy it forever. To save the boy, Ellie must prove who he really is. The opening



chapter almost put me off this book but I persevered and was soon hooked. A good choice for KS3 fantasy adventure readers.




#### Vampire Dusk series by Sebastian Rook

I liked how the story was narrated in the first person and we are able to feel as if we are living the story along with Tris.


The films are amazing but definitely read the books first. I loved this Trilogy and would recommend it to all of our Dystopian fans in Year 8 and above.



In 1516, Thomas More wrote about 'Utopia' as a fictional island society where everyone lived in harmony. We have to move on several centuries to 1895 for the publication of the first Dystopian novel, 'The Time Machine' by H.G. Wells.

Dystopia is the opposite of Utopia and a Dystopian society is characterised by a new social order favouring the elite minority whilst the majority live in poverty. 'The Time Machine' was followed by more Dystopian Classics, 'We' by Yevgeny Zamyatin, 'Brave New World' by Aldous Huxley and '1984' by George Orwell.

Dystopian fiction today is arguably the most popular genre amongst young people. Should we be concerned that - in an era of climate change (earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, extinction), global warming, radicalisation, terrorism and the Covid 19 pandemic - our secondary school pupils want to read this type of 'fiction'?

I didn't like the layout because I didn't know what to read first so it could be improved a lot!





