WHAT IS HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY?

Holocaust Memorial Day is the day for everyone to remember the millions of people murdered in the Holocaust, under Nazi Persecution, and in the genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia, and Darfur.

It takes place on the 27th January each year. This date was chosen as it marks the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp.

The Holocaust threatened the fabric of civilisation and genocide must still be resisted every day. Our world often feels fragile and vulnerable and we cannot be complacent. Even in the UK, prejudice and the language of hatred must be challenged by us all.

HMD is for everyone. Each year across the UK, thousands of people come together to learn more about the past and take action to create a safer future. We know they learn more, empathise more and do more.

Together we bear witness for those who endured genocide, and honour the survivors and all those whose lives were changed beyond all recognition.


The theme for HMD 2021 is Be the light in the darkness to encourage everyone to take action to 'be the light'.



Loans, a recap for those in School:


Each pupil has their own library account and may borrow up to three books at a time.

Main characters: Nicholas Flamel, Sophie, Josh, Scathach, John Dee, the Dark Elders, Perrenelle


Main story line: Josh and Sophie Newman are ordinary teenagers until they meet Nick Fleming (also known as Nicholas Flamel) who takes them to the Dark Elders. When they discover the secret to destroying and saving the Universe, Nicholas needs them to awaken their powers so he can fight his enemy, Dr John Dee. Unfortunately, only Sophie's powers are awakened...

Rating: I would rate this book Overall; it was really exciting but did become a little stale in places. It would be great for people who like reading Harry potter!

What I liked: You could feel like you were really there and it was easy to imagine what the Alchemyst's Worlds looked like.

What could be improved: I think it needs a glossary at the back of the book so if you didn't know what a particular magical word meant, you could look it up quickly. Everything else was very exciting and fun!

Nicholas Flamel is referred to in the Harry Potter books as the French wizard and famed alchemist, the only known maker of the Philosopher's Stone, a legendary substance with incredible powers. He is described as a close friend of former Hogwarts' Headmaster Albus Dumbledore. In truth, Nicolas Flamel was born in Paris on 28 September 1330. Genre: Dystopian Fiction



Genre: Dystopian Fiction







Genre: Fantasy



A well-written, fast paced debut novel and an absolute must read for those with an interest in World War II.


Genre: Historical Fiction (World War II) (this is a bit of a stretch and I may move to our Adventure section depending on your feedback)





'I live with Mama and Papa in Munich. Food is still rationed, though the war ended over ten years ago. My boyfriend is Jewish. I have to hide this from my parents...Sometimes I think they are hiding something from me, too.' This is a fascinating story which gives a real insight into the consequences of Hitler's policies and sadly, the racial prejudice which poisoned the Post-War years. An absolute 'must read'.

Genre: Historical Fiction (World War II)



February, 1941. After months of bombing raids in London, twelve-year-old Olive Bradshaw and her little brother Cliff are evacuated to the Devon coast. Before they leave, their older sister goes missing in an air raid. Olive is desperate to find out that happened to her and then she finds a strange coded note which seems to link Sukie to Devon and a secret mission. This book was recommended to me by a number of Year 7s and I am so pleased a I read it.



An epic journey of police chases, storms at sea and unexpected puppies. Set in the aftermath of


World War I the story follows two orphans as they take their narrowboat across the Channel in search of lost loved ones and a place to call home.



Rena Finder was only eleven when the Nazis forced her and her family – along with all the other Jewish families – into the ghetto in Krakow, Poland. Rena worked as a slave labourer with scarcely any food and watched as friends and family were sent away. Rena and her mother were saved by the bravery and generosity of Oskar Schindler. This is a short book which serves as a 'gentle' introduction to the horrors of the Holocaust for our more sensitive KS3 readers.

Genre: True Stories (Holocaust)





This book tells the story of Hollywood icon Hedy Lamarr and gives a fascinating insight into the build up to the 'Final Solution' as well as the place of women in the World. It does come to an abrupt end and I wanted to find out more so I did a little research on the Internet. As a result I suspect that some poetic licence has been taken by the author, otherwise this would have received a 5 star rating. Recommended for Year 9+ readers.


Genre: Biography (I may shelve in True Stories!)







Genre : Horror

The Stromberg family move from Stockholm to manage an isolated pine plantation in northern Sweden. The snow comes early and the family are cut off from the outside world. The daughter (we never find out her name) explores the old plantation house, wary of the ancient housekeeper and increasingly disturbed by local folk lore and the oppressive atmosphere created by the dense pine trees and blanket of snow. I disliked the daughter but was held by a captivating build up and an unexpected ending.


Fans of the Red Eye Horror series will love this one.



Corbet Staff BOOKCLUB Reading for Christmas


We held our-after School Zoom meeting on 9th December (sadly no mince pies and mulled wine) and agreed on this selection of books to read over December and January 2021:

The members might be pushing eighty but they still have a few tricks up their sleeves. Can our unorthodox but brilliant gang catch the killer before it's too late? This debut novel has 'rave reviews' and Mrs Frank has started reading it already and has praised its 'feel good' factor. Looking forward to this one!

This book is on our Year 9 Book-et list and is another brilliant debut novel. Our unlikely heroine is Flora 717, a sanitation bee on the bottom rung of the hive hierarchy. Living to accept, obey and serve, she is prepared to sacrifice everything for her beloved holy mother, the Queen. Yet Flora 717 is exceptional and in the face of an increasingly desperate struggle for survival she changes her own destiny and that of the hive. Mrs Brett can highly recommend this book, you forget they are bees, it could be us!





Recommended by one of our new members, this biography tells the remarkable story of Hedy Lamarr. Who would have thought this Hollywood icon was married to an Austrian arms dealer who was a Nazi sympathiser and she was therefore privy to secrets of the Third Reich? Not only beautiful, Lamarr was also a talented Scientist living in a 'man's world' yet her ground breaking invention revolutionised modern communication.

Nora Seed's life has been full of misery and regret but when she finds herself in the Midnight Library, she has a chance to make things right. As she tries to undo her past mistakes and create the perfect life, her choices place the Library and herself in danger. Before time runs out, she must answer the ultimate question: what is the best way to live?






