

Astronomy



Back in March, Year 7 attended a Zoom talk by Alexia Southern from the Jodrell Bank Observatory. Students were given the opportunity to propose questions to our 'space expert' and she satisfied their curiosities with phenomenal insights of the universe as well as practical demonstrations.

Things that were discussed included:

- When will the sun blow up? our sun is a medium sized star. It will happen in about 5.5 billion years, its going to expand and then swallow Mercury, Venus and us. It'll be a red giant until it burns all its fuel. It'll become a planetary nebula and then become a white dwarf star – not very hot and radiating its energy until it becomes a ball of matter.
- If the sun was 8 times bigger, then it would follow a different path/life cycle that would eventually become a black hole or a neutron star.
- We saw the Jodrell bank 'black hole' where Alexia put lots and lots and lots of things into a film canister (they were secretly being dissolved by acetone). If it was a real black hole, the Earth would be crushed to the size of a 10p piece.
- It will be 70000 years until voyager meets the next solar system – voyager has left our solar system. Voyager has a gold record containing lots of information about Earth including maps, what we understand about chemistry and what humans look like and some sounds.
- Alexa thinks that the planet that is most likely to have life on is Mars. Most places are too hot or too cold for life. Living creatures need water so survive. Water has been found on the moon as ice and on Mars as ice and in underground lakes!
- We watched the imploding can demonstration to understand what would happen if the air pressure was too high on a planet – Alexia used a blow torch and can – do not try this at home!
- A Tardigrade is an extremophile which could survive in a different environment in suspended animation – tardigrades are currently the only living creature on the moon-china put them there!
- We have observed lots of exoplanets using the Kepler telescope – there are only artists impressions of these planets. We can look at what gases are on these planets by using spectroscopy. We look for Earth like planets as these might have life on them.

- We use radiowaves with the Jodrell bank telescope and Alexia can't have her phone on at work!
- SETI use the Jodrell bank telescope to check for life. They are listening for things like alien radio wave TV. Alexia thinks that this is highly unlikely.
- We learned that Scientists do not have all the answers! Alexia couldn't answer 'What caused the big bang' and where did the energy come from? We know from Einstein that $E=mc^2$ and the big bang was a joke name for someone's theory as scientists thought it was a rubbish theory to begin with...it would be better to cause it the big expansion!
- There is a black hole in our galaxy – it is near the Sagittarius star constellation. If you are at the boundary of a black hole, you will get pulled in (at the event horizon) but if our sun turned into a black hole, we wouldn't get pulled in as the gravity wouldn't increase and we would just keep orbiting the sun.
- We saw the first picture of the black hole in our galaxy – the telescope that took the photo needed to read the date on 10p coin imagining that the coin was in Egypt and we were here in the UK!
- The milky way is a spiral galaxy.
- The Lovell telescope took 5 years to build and its about 75 years old. The dish must be accurate to 3mm.
- The telescope has been used for war and tracking the carrier rocket for the first Russian satellite sputnik in the 1950's.
- How far can the largest telescope see? the Hubble space telescope went into space in 1990 - it has the field of view of about a tennis ball 100m away. Just this small field of view shows 13/14 billion light years away the light that the telescope may not be there anymore! The galaxies might be gone!
- The Array is a giant telescope that is being built.
- Our moon is the 5th largest moon in our solar system!
- The Parker probe is on its way to the sun it was launched in 2018 – we think it'll take a few years to get to the sun. It has taken 3 years so far and has just reached Venus so 5-6 years.
- We asked why Alexia does the job that she does. She has a master's in physics and is a science communicator – she has been on Newsround!

The students were grateful to have had this opportunity. Thank you to Mrs Frank for arranging the Zoom call.

Here is some of the student feedback:

EW "I was amazed that NASA have sent satellite out of our galaxy with objects to explain to anyone out there what we understand and look like."

IC "I thought the thing that blew me away was that the moon is moving away from us 3cm each year, so I thought that that was quite scary but also fascinating!"

PQ "The most fascinating thing about the talk with Alexia from Jodrell Bank is that I learnt why a black hole has it's name. I really enjoyed the talk!"

RD "I found that the most amazing thing was that Voyager 2 will take 70,000 years just to reach the closest solar system to us."

GH "I never knew the sun was a large ball of gas, and plasma!"

NP "Black holes were named by accident"

EG "I enjoyed when she taught us about planets that could possibly have life on it such as Mars and how if we were to go on Venus we would be squashed because the air pressure is high and I also liked when she was talking about how maybe if there at the right place at the right time they might find radio waves from aliens!"

OP "The fact that voyager 1 and 2 had information about humans and this planet was amazing. I never knew and simply knowing it feels amazing that an alien might find it and possibly send something back to us if we're lucky. It's mind blowing really."

CA "I found it amazing that they said they would start bringing people to mars within the next 10-15 years"


EH "The fact that you can fit ALL the plants between the Earth and the Moon!"

Blue stripe for the sky


Yellow stripe for the sun




Wildlife Photography Competition




6. OUR YOUNG ARTISTS

I think we can all agree that the last year has been like no other. I have been incredibly proud to be associated with our School staff and pupils who have all 'gone above and beyond' following Covid safety rules and continuing with learning whilst supporting each other in our School community. Our Library continues to 'double up' as a Year 9 classroom and during morning registration I can be seen dashing in and out of various tutor rooms delivering books as part of my Click-and-Drop service. Since September, we have loaned out over 950 books to Years 7 to 10. Even without access to the Library, our Student Library Team is still going strong (with eleven Pupil Librarians and six Year 7 trainees) thanks to our regular Zoom meetings.

The decision was taken early on to waive fines and not to charge for Library books lost during the various Lockdowns. This means we have stock to replace but we also need to purchase new titles and expand our Manga range to ensure our Library continues to thrive. Sadly, our budget cannot stretch to accommodate all this without additional fund raising, hence my Library Fund Raiser Quiz with many of the prizes kindly donated by Asda.


