Library Reading Groups




Whilst our little book club is meeting up during Monday lunchtimes, the Library is remaining open for everyone to use so it does get a little noisy!

We have been looking at neglected books on our Library shelves, deciding which to withdraw and which to save. We have also challenged ourselves to read 'Black Brother Black Brother' by Jewell Parker Rhodes, ready to discuss after Christmas. This title was one of the free book sets from BookTrust and is described as 'a powerful coming-of-age story about two brothers - one who presents as white, the other as Black - and the ways they are forced to navigate a world that doesn't treat them equally'.



We will be writing mini reviews for all the Library books we read, giving them jammy dodger or Carnegie star ratings. For example, 1 jammy dodger or 1 star = disappointing; 5 jammy dodgers or 5 stars = unputadownable. These mini reviews will be placed inside the front covers to help our readers with their book selections.

We do need more readers to join us to form a **Carnegie Shadowing group**. Shadowing gives pupils across the UK the opportunity to vote for their favourite Carnegie shortlisted book. This is a great way of making pupils feel involved as they do not always agree with the adult judges! Our teenager is a bit grumpy, tired and then mentions 'I can't seem to catch my breath'. It's now 11am, just 18 hours since the negative result. We all do another test and those strips of plastic we are now so accustomed to might as well have had flashing lights; an immediate positive. Everyone is confined to their rooms.

<u>Day Eight</u>

Our teenager has remained isolated in their room. All meals delivered to the door, fresh towels and bedding every day, masks at every medication drop, masks at topping up of water. We are timetabling use of the bathroom, wiping down every single surface as we go time after time after time!
