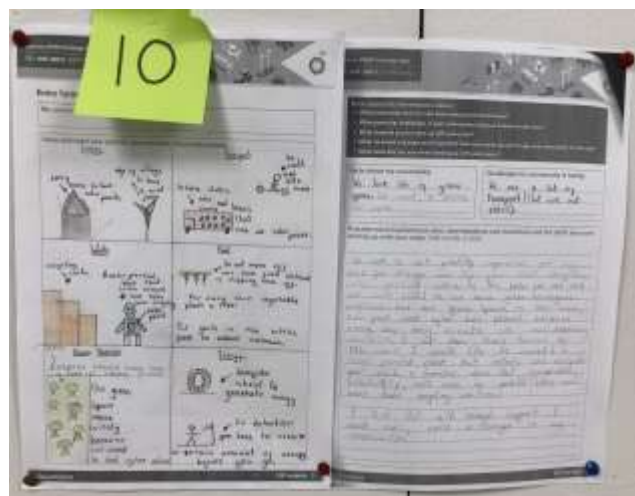

Oswestry Music Festival 4th - 6th March



This year's music festival in Oswestry was a momentous occasion as it sorely missed for the last 2 years due to the covid-19 pandemic.

12 students from the Corbet School participated in this event across several different classes and age groups. **Patrick Davies** and **Daniel Castille** performed on drums, **Anouk Hall** and **Bea Lewis** played the piano, **Oscar Alexander** and **Elizabeth Selman** took part on their clarinets and the other woodwind entry was **Beth Meddins** on the flute. **Mathilda Wright** was our only brass entry on the cornet and **Frances Hoggart** played the harp! **Emily Whitmore**, **Blossom Burton**, **Macey Furniss** and **Patrick Davies** also sang in individual classes.

It was an exciting day that took place across three different venues in Oswestry; Christchurch, Hermon Chapel and the Methodist Chapel. There was an adjudicator and an open public audience including families and friends of the competitors in those classes. We had to be incredibly organised as the competition required pre-rehearsals with accompanists as well as remembering to take additional copies of music, backing tracks and working out the timings of the day.

Some of the classes required you to learn 'test pieces' and some were own choice. The grading system was very comprehensive; this festival, in line with many others affiliated to the British and International Federation of Festivals for music, dance and speech, uses the following system of categories/grades, as laid out by the British and International Federation of Festivals. Since the purpose of the festival movement is education, it is believed that this will make a better use of the adjudicator's time in providing helpful and constructive criticism with encouragement, both verbally and on the adjudication sheet received by each competitor.

The categories/grades adopted were:

FAIR	A performance limited in its communication.
MODERATE	A performance showing development of technique and/or communication.
MERIT	A capable performance showing some artistic appreciation and/or technical ability.
COMMENDED	A convincing performance technically and artistically.
DISTINCTION	An excellent performance technically and artistically.

Oswestry Music Festival 4th - 6th March

OUTSTANDING An exceptional performance both technically and artistically.

The adjudicators based their assessments of these categories/grades on the following criteria:

- (a) security of rhythm and pitch.
- (b) appropriate choices of tempi.
- (c) thoughtful phrasing, breathing and bowing.
- (d) secure, varied and appropriate articulation.
- (e) confident and safe intonation.
- (f) varied tone with well-defined dynamics.
- (g) a clear and precise ensemble with a good balance between instruments or hands.
- (h) good posture and a sense of presence on the platform.
- (i) a convincing interpretation of the composer's intentions.

Everyone who attended received a certificate and feedback sheet with their results. 5 of our students were placed in the top 3 of their classes and 4 were awarded distinctions!

Particularly high praise was given to:

Patrick Davies – 1st place, drums (distinction) and 2nd place, singing (commended)

Emily Whitmore – 2nd, 3rd and 4th place, singing (distinction, commended and merit),

Mathilda Wright – 2nd place, cornet (distinction)

Elizabeth Selman – 2nd place, clarinet (distinction)

Daniel Castille – 3rd place, drums

We would like to congratulate everybody for their participation of this prestigious event and thank you for representing the Corbet School. Hopefully even more students will come along next year to take on this challenge and build their confidence in music.

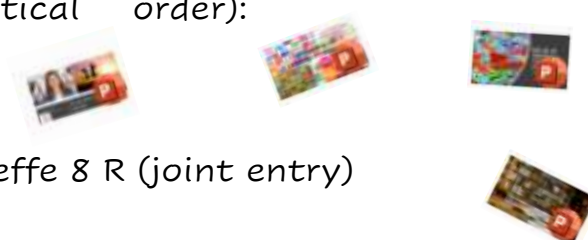

Gosh! We have been busy in our School Library and the Christmas holidays seem like a lifetime ago. Here are the highlights:

- January :**
1. Our postponed **Librarian Christmas party** and the Award of 'If I' Certificates.
 2. Book displays **for Holocaust Memorial Day**. We are continuing to expand our range of true stories as there is considerable student interest in the Holocaust. Sadly the issue of learning from genocide for a better future is becoming increasingly relevant.
 3. We continued with the **major reorganisation** of our Library to 'showcase' our remaining books and make them more accessible. Based on feedback from the Student Librarian team, we began to 'refresh' our non-fiction section with **new books** as well as purchasing **new fiction reads**.

Currently, we have **60 overdue Library books**. **Please check at home**. If we have to replace, this will reduce the number of new titles we can purchase this year.

Chess: Every Wednesday lunchtime, our Library is full of chess players and since Christmas, Mr Evans has been the arbiter of two tournaments. Congratulations to the recent winners and medal recipients Seb and Cameron.



Debating: We have a lively group who, in three months, have debated diverse subjects including the ongoing situation in Ukraine, the School Dress Code and the true identity of 'Jack the Ripper'. We have had fun with alley debates as well as the 'umm and err' game. Thanks to Katherine Oldham, our Debate Captain.



Our **Library Readers**, the **Jammie Dodgers** continue to impress with their enthusiasm and willingness to try different books.
