Unscheduled School Closure Arrangements

We make every effort to keep the school open but our primary concern has to be the safety of staff and pupils. As a rural school with a large catchment area we consider many factors including site safety, transport and staffing. We publish the following arrangements to follow in the event of a school closure. We ask you to **please keep this section in a safe place for future reference.**

The school will make announcements via the **school website**; the alerts will display one of the following messages:

- School open
- We are consulting on any possible school closure and will advise you as soon as possible
- School closed
- You are advised to tune into any local radio station; they will announce any school closures.
- Updates will also be posted on the school's Facebook and Twitter feed.
- If the school is closing, we shall send a **text message** alert to parents via the schools messaging system.
- Please do not attempt to contact the school to make individual arrangements with your child. We will need access to phone lines to contact transport providers, staff and other essential service providers.
- **Please note** all pupils who travel on school transport will be expected to return home on school transport.
- If the weather deteriorates suddenly, we will provide advice on the website regarding revised arrangements for school transport.
- If necessary, transport will be dispatched early and you will be notified by text message.
- Parents can refer to school closures on the Council website <u>shropshire.gov.uk/school-closures/</u> secondary-schools
- If there is more widespread severe weather the Shropshire Council Authority will activate a **Helpline** for parents. (When operating, the Helpline number will be given out by the Radio Stations).

Pupils travelling by school bus should wait at their usual collection point for 30 minutes after the usual pick-up time. If the bus does not arrive, please return home. This is normal practice during pick-up time if the bus is delayed.

All parents/carers are asked to make appropriate arrangements for their child in case of an unscheduled school closure during the working day. Please make sure your child is aware of these arrangements and have completed page 1 of their pupil handbook.

Please can parents ensure the school has up to date contact details, preferably a mobile number (for texts), which can be updated by the Parent Lite App.

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Summer 2023 Exams Contingency Days

The awarding bodies have collectively agreed a contingency day for several years now which is always scheduled at the end of the GCSE, GCE AS and A-level exam timetables.

The contingency day is in the event of national or significant local disruption to exams in the United Kingdom, being part of the awarding bodies' standard contingency planning for exams.

Following the Covid-19 pandemic, further resilience was needed within the exam timetables. A single contingency day was not felt to be sufficient if a national event or incident had a significant effect on the exam timetable. For example, summer exams could be affected by extremely high temperatures.

For the June 2023 exams, the awarding bodies have therefore introduced two additional half-day contingency sessions. These are on **Thursday 8 June 2023** and **Thursday 15 June 2023**. The standard contingency day remains at the end of the timetable being scheduled on **Wednesday 28 June 2023**.

Schools and colleges should ensure candidates and parents are aware of the contingency arrangements on these three days. They should consider the contingency day of Wednesday 28 June 2023 when making their plans for the summer. **Candidates should be encouraged to remain available until Wednesday 28 June 2023 should examinations need to be rescheduled.**

Project Sunflower, Seeds for Ukraine




The response to Project Sunflower was very successful. And thank you to all those that sent in packets of seeds.



Dr Tinker nominated Anna Fairley for all the hard work and dedication she put in in setting up Corbet Clothes.






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8A4 Model Lungs





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Spaghetti Towers

Natural Entrepreneurs: Inspire a Suitable future and Design a Sustainable World

25 students from Year 9 took part in a whole day project on the theme of *Biomimicry* this term. It was an exciting day with a mix of computer work, practical and outdoor learning. Students were tasked with matching biological features with engineering solutions, as well as learning about circular economy and natures unifying patterns through a scavenger hunt. We had outside speakers leading us through the project and students were able to access work online from other students, doing similar projects, across the continent! The project leaders were delighted with the work that students put in and the students, of course, were a credit to us, showing high engagement and exemplary behaviour. Read the write up from the team below:

Natural Entrepreneurs is an EU funded Erasmus+ project. It encourages students to explore biomimicry as a fundamental research and design tool that can be employed to aid Europe's transition to a more sustainable future.

'How can we learn from nature to create a positive future for people and planet?' This is a big question to ask of a group of Year 9s at ten past nine on a bleak January morning. The primary aim of today's workshop to is to test out the *Natural Entrepreneurs* website – a collaborative learning platform where young people across Europe are encouraged to work in teams to solve a design challenge linked to one of the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals: 'How to grow food in cities' for example, or 'How can buildings adapt to changing sea levels and increased flooding?'. The secondary aim is to encourage the students to seriously consider the field of biomimicry as the foundation of their future careers – to become the people who design buildings that cool themselves without energy from fossil fuels, the people who create clothing that doesn't harm the planet and the people who make glue that doesn't kill us.

The first thing to sort out is defining biomimicry. With help from BBC Bitesize the message gets across with little fuss – the students are immediately intrigued and want to know more. Making clothing out of bacteria holds a particular fascination for this age group. The packaging 'brick' made of mycelium is passed around eagerly, and becomes of even more interest when some of the class realise they have already received something like it in the post. The phrases 'real world' and 'own life' creep up again and again throughout the day.

Just before break, the class login into the platform, create their team profiles and identify their skillsets – not just biology, chemistry, physics, but art, design, engineering and more – drawing on all their knowledge and interests to work out their strengths and how they can effectively work as a team. So begins their journey to become *Natural Entrepreneurs* and a part of the wider biomimicry community, taking them through a design process from challenge to potential product and linking them to other teams in other schools in other countries working on similar problems.

Yet while the fascination for technology keeps the students engaged all afternoon, it's the time

spent with nature, the outdoor learning lesson spent searching for specimens, that makes the biggest impact when they are asked what they like most about the day: 'Being able to explore outside and find bugs and plants', 'Looking through foliage', 'Going outside to be with nature instead of just looking at it on a screen', 'The outside work ... gave us the opportunity to work with other people and think about things I wouldn't normally think about'.

And the most exciting moment of all? Probably the group effort to haul a massive decaying log from under the hedge and the call to grab the pooters for 'Detrivores! Woodlice city!'. Such a simple task: find a species, identify functions (exoskeleton protects from attack), describe strategy (scales made of calcium, seven segments), find another species, and another species ... Advanced Forest School meets start your own business and improve the world along the way – no wonder 84% said they could see biomimicry 'as a way to make a sustainable and better future' by the end of the day.

Oswestry Music Festival

Oswestry Music Festival took place this year on Wednesday 1st - Sunday 5th March and The Corbet School competitors were very successful!

23 students in total took part from The Corbet School, all performing in a wide range of different categories and age groups. Radio Active, our resident rock band, (Rueben Darlow, Shane Clover, Owen Clifton Moore, Oscar Alexander, Sam Murphy and Lily Poston) played an original song and came 3rd! George Varney, Blake Mackechnie, Beatrix Lewis and Matthew Selman performed on the piano. Heidi MacKechnie, Patrick Davies, and Blossom Burton sung vocal pieces. Lochlan Woodwind played the guitar. The flute was played by Francesca Widdon and Anouk Hall. Matthew Selman played the trumpet and Elizabeth Selman played the Clarinet. Tilly Wright on the Cornet and Frances Hoggart played the harp. There was a great variation in instruments and styles, and everybody did exceedingly well.

The event was spread across 5 days, including a final awards ceremony. Performances were held in a church that was open to the public so that family and friends could watch. All performers were required to bring a copy of their music for the judge panel so that they could follow along. Feedback was given to each participant after their category had performed. It was a very organised event. Once we arrived at the venue, a member of staff showed us into a small room on the lower floor of the church where we could tune our instrument and practice. When our category started, we sat in the audience until we were called onto stage. It was nerve wracking but a great experience! All participants received a certificate and a feedback sheet with their results. 5 of our performers made it into the top 3 and 6 competitors from Corbet were awarded Distinctions.

The students also engaged in a range of evening activities after the students time on the slopes, including a pizza night, which was hugely popular with the students and staff alike, with the other nights being filled with a quiz night, bowling and an enjoyable trip into the town of Aosta where the students were given a taste of Italian life with shopping and gallons of gelato being consumed!

The week flew by for the Corbet skiers, with the final night being hosted up by the ski instructors travelling up to the St Nicolas to celebrate all the successes by the students throughout the week. The students then boarded back onto the buses and begun the 22-hour trip back home through the night, finally stopping for one final breakfast on the ferry back home. We hope that the students thoroughly enjoyed the trip and take away memories that last a life-time.

Children who are aged 4, who attend a nursery or pre-school are unfortunately not eligible for the HAF programme, activities are not suitable. Eligible children aged 4+, must be in full time education and have started school in Reception Class (or equivalent).

During the three main school holidays, children and young people are invited to take part in a range of fun activities, happening at venues from across the county.

Funded by the DfE (Department for Education), the aim of the programme, is to make holiday activities as accessible and inclusive as possible
