


















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KS2 Maths Morning






Science Week 2023



Biology Challenge

8A4 Learn About Digestion

The digestive system is a very complex organ system that students find challenging to understand and retain knowledge about. This term, 8a4 have been modelling the digestive system through a series of demonstrations.


This involved the acquisition of a teachers packed lunch and then putting in through the following processes:

Tearing - *incisor teeth* Grinding with a pestle and mortar - *molar teeth* Adding fluid - *saliva and amylase (an enzyme)* Pushing it into bag - *passing down the oesophagus and into the stomach* Squeezing the bag and adding orange juice - *the stomach churning and adding acid and more enzymes* Pushing it through some tights - *the small intestine absorbing nutrients into the blood* Squeezing out water onto a towel - *the large intestine absorbing water* knotting the tights - *faeces stored in the rectum* Squeezing out the remains - *faeces expelled through the anus*

Your digestive system takes in food, breaks it down into the nutrients and energy your body needs, and then gets rid of the waste. Most of your digestive system is a long tube that runs from your mouth to your rectum. This "tube" includes your oesophagus, stomach, and intestines. Your digestive system also includes organs that help digestion, such as the pancreas and liver.

You could try this at home! it is a great starting point for learning about the main organs in the digestive system.

Insects

Here is a short article about the residents in lab 4:

Madeleine, 10R, kindly donated 6 stick insects and a few eggs (which looked like seeds) to the Science department for observation and nurturing.

Students have enjoyed looking through the window in lab 4 and 'hunting' for them amongst the ivy. They are the masters of camouflage!

Like any insect, stick insects have six legs, antennae and their bodies are divided into three segments: head, thorax and abdomen. They occur on all continents except for Antarctica and their natural range is very broad; in temperate and tropical temperatures and in dry or wet conditions.

Stick insects live for about a year and can change colours to fit into their surroundings. No wonder it takes so long to see them in the tank! Stick insects can regenerate limbs and can also reproduce without males.

Our eggs hatched and we now have 15 living insects. They were 6mm upon arrival and after 5 weeks have grown to a whopping 42mm! They should be fully grown at 75mm by which time, I may need to invest in a larger home for them.

Crystallisation

Shortly after Easter, Year 9 embarked on their GCSE Science journey; 9a1 started with chemistry and have been learning about atomic structure and the periodic table.

One particular lesson that they studied involved 'suggesting an appropriate separation or purification technique for an unfamiliar mixture' and also 'being able to explain in detail how multi-step separation techniques work'.

The students thrived on the challenge of this practical lesson and embarked on a variety of techniques including dissolving, filtering, evaporating and distilling a selection of different mixtures.

The outcome of experiments resulted in these beautiful crystals: the white cubes are sodium chloride and the blue diamonds are copper sulfate. The crystals are formed in different shapes due to the bonding and a process known as the water of crystallisation for example, five water molecules are present in one formula unit of copper sulfate.

From this topic, students might lead into work at A level on organic chemistry, analytical chemistry or measurement science.

Corbet School Qualifies for Faraday National Final

A total of 176 events took place across the UK to host the 2022-2023 IET Faraday[®] Challenge Days. Up to six teams of local school students competed at each event to find the best solution to the engineering-related challenge. The Corbet school team of

qualified as one of the top 5 teams from over a 1,000 teams and were therefore part of the top 0.5% of Year 8 students at the final. As well as qualifying for the final the IET arranged for rail transport, accommodation and an additional day to visit the Digital Aviation Research and Technology Centre (DARTeC) at Cranfield University. During the visit students experienced drone flying, tours of the robotics research centre and plane laboratory.

This year's challenge was in association with UKRI's Future Flight Challenge and tasked teams to design a prototype that could support UKRI's Future Flight Challenge with regards to accessibility and ease of use, safety and impact on the environment.

The final was judged by Michelle Richmond, Director of Membership and Professional Development at the IET, Ama Frimpong, IET Young Woman Engineer of the Year 2022, Vicki Murdie, Innovation Lead at UKRI's Future Flight Challenge, Amy Camp, Innovation Lead at UKRI's Future Flight Challenge, and Adrian Cole, Programme Manager at DARTeC.

The events aim to encourage more young people to study and consider exciting and rewarding careers in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) by using creativity, innovation and problem-solving skills.

Natalie Moat, IET Faraday[®] Education Manager, said: "Students who took part in the IET Faraday[®] Challenge Days this year have experienced working as an engineer through hands-on and practical engagement with real-life challenges relating to UKRI's Future Flight Challenge. The quality of the students' work throughout has been fantastic and it was an extremely close final. "There is huge demand for new engineers and technicians and we're confident that this challenge has helped to change young people's perceptions of engineers and inspire the next generation. It's given students an insight into the life of a real engineer, the variety a career in engineering can offer and just how exciting and creative engineering really is."

Vicki Murdie, Innovation Lead at UKRI's Future Flight Challenge said: "It has been a fantastic opportunity for the UKRI Future Flight Challenge to partner with the IET this year for the IET Faraday[®] Challenge. The energy and engagement at the events has been inspirational. We have seen how much the students enjoyed the chance to complete hands on engineering design and build work, and really thinking about how to develop solutions that support uses of future flight technologies. We are sure that through these events, the schools and students will have seen the world of possibilities that a career in engineering offers and the benefits that future forms of flight

will bring to society."

Professor Graham Braithwaite, Director of Transport Systems at Cranfield University, said: "It was fantastic to welcome these enthusiastic and talented students to Cranfield University. Engineering is a fascinating and exciting career option, and we hope that many of them will be inspired to follow this path. We warmly congratulate them and perhaps we will see some of them studying here at Cranfield in the future!"

Although our team did not quite win the top prize they were exemplary ambassadors for the Corbet school and received a runner's up prize of £250 to be spent on STEM and the students received individual certificates. The IET Faraday[®] Challenge Days are part of a wider Education programme, made up of a whole host of teaching resources and activities to inspire and attract the engineers of tomorrow.



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French Trip 26th - 30th June

We have had a fantastic time in France and I consider it the best and most exciting French trip I have ever been on. We have had to deal with a few unexpected things (above all the issue of another coach driving into our parked coach at night and finding it written off on the morning of our planned Paris excursion day!), but the teamwork, the timely communication, the cooperation, and can-do attitude of all parties involved have made it a wonderful experience for everyone! I just cannot praise the team highly enough: Mr Shee, Mrs Stone, Mrs Cole and Mr Crewe, the pupils, the Glo-Ed travel company, and the French in Normandy School with their host families. They have made this a memorable experience for our pupils. The trip activities were unaffected by the unrest in Paris. The pupils enjoyed two mornings of lessons in the French in Normandy School, had a guided tour of Rouen, including the Historial Jeanne d'Arc museum and the Cathedral. In Paris, we went on a river cruise on the Seine, admired the Arc de Triomphe, La Tour Eiffel, the Louvre building and park. We ended our tour of Paris at Montmartre, where we enjoyed the views over Paris and saw la basilique du Sacré-Coeur. On the Place de Tertre (artist's square) pupils bought souvenirs and enjoyed free time.

Aw, so French, all these people walking around with baguettes! (while driving into Rouen on the day of arrival)

It's absolutely amazing here! (As a spontaneous first response to our check-up phone call to a group of pupils and their host family)

Pupils were very engaged, with many asking interesting questions and leaving feeling inspired to find out more. I wonder how many intelligence analyst linguists we have in our midst.




OUR SCHOOL



SHROPSHIRE HAF PROGRAMME

Shropshire HAF (Holiday Activities and Food) managed by Shropshire Council is an exciting programme of holiday activities.

Over the Christmas holidays, schools, voluntary and community organisations, and childcare providers are running activities.

There are free places available on the HAF programme for children and young people aged 4 (reception class age) to 16, who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals and for those who have been referred onto HAF by a professional.

Children who are aged 4, who attend a nursery or pre-school are unfortunately not eligible for the HAF programme, activities are not suitable. Eligible children aged 4+, must be in full time education and have started school in Reception Class (or equivalent).

During the three main school holidays, children and young people are invited to take part in a range of fun activities, happening at venues from across the county.

Funded by the DfE (Department for Education), the aim of the programme, is to make holiday activities as accessible and inclusive as possible

How to access the free activities

All bookings for the Shropshire HAF programme are now being made through a centralised booking system.

All eligible families will have been emailed an information leaflet, which will include a code via their school or professional you are working with.
