

Unscheduled School Closure Arrangements

We make every effort to keep the school open but our primary concern has to be the safety of our staff and pupils. As a rural school with a large catchment area we consider many factors including site safety, transport and staffing. We publish the following arrangements to follow in the event of a school closure. We ask you to **please keep this section in a safe place for future reference**.

The school will make the following announcements via the school website; the alerts will display one of the following messages:

- School Open
- We are consulting on any possible school closure and will advise you as soon as possible
- School closed
- You are advised to tune into any local radio station; they will announce any school closures
- If the school is closing, we shall send a text message and an email to alert parents via the schools messaging system.
- Please do not attempt to contact the school to make individual arrangements with your child. We will need to access the phone lines to contact transport providers, staff and other essential service providers.
- **Please note** All pupils who travel on school transport will be expected to return home on school transport.
- If necessary, transport will be dispatched early and you will notified by text message and email.
- Parents can refer to school closures on Shropshire Council website <u>Shropshire.gov.uk/school-closures/secondary-schools</u>
- If there is more widespread severe weather, Shropshire Council Authority will activate a **Helpline** for parents. (When operating, the helpline number will be given out by the Radio Stations)

Pupils travelling by school bus should wait at their usual collection point for 30 minutes after the usual pick-up time. If the bus does not arrive, please return home. This is normal practice during pick-up time if the bus is delayed.

All parents/carers are asked to make appropriate arrangements for their child in case of an unscheduled school closure during the working day. Please make sure your child is aware of these arrangement's and have completed Page 1 of their pupil handbook.

Please can parents ensure the school has up to date contact details, preferably a mobile number (for texts) and an email address, which can be updated by the Parent Lite App.

Lost Property

Japanese

It was a lot of work - I had weekly lessons during term time and then had to do some practicing on my own, but I am glad I did it. I am taking a break for a year to focus on the rest of my GCSEs but hope to come back to it next year and work towards an international qualification called JLPT.

Forensic Science at Science Club

The fascination of forensic science took centre stage in the first Autumn half term, as the Science Club delved into an enthralling exploration of investigative techniques. With a record 15 enthusiastic participants, the club embarked on a captivating journey into the world of crime-solving, unravelling mysteries through a series of engaging experiments and analyses.

From the outset, the club members embraced the challenge with unwavering curiosity. Each session was an immersive experience, featuring a diverse array of activities designed to emulate real-life forensic procedures. Chromatography sessions revealed the pen used by the suspects while fingerprinting exercises allowed participants to decipher unique patterns and markings.

The microscopic world of fibres became a fascinating terrain under the microscope lens, as students examined and identified various fabrics and hair, honing their observation skills to distinguish minute details. Flame tests ignited excitement as chemicals revealed their distinctive hues, prompting eager discussions and deductions about which suspect was found next to which white powder.

The pinnacle of the project was the profiling of suspects, where students employed their newfound knowledge and skills to analyse evidence. Guided by their understanding of the scientific methods acquired throughout the term, they pieced together clues, honed their deductive reasoning, and ultimately made informed conclusions about the 'suspects'.



Open Evening



Maths Young Leaders





It is heart warming to see Morgan, Lucy and Erin still actively involved in our Library family, chatting with team members and helping our younger trainees.



One Student Librarian, **Amy Cooke**, has had a stellar 2023, excelling in Mathematics (Junior Kangaroo Challenge), Languages (GCHQ Challenge), Science (Faraday Competition) as well as shooting (competing for our School, Scouts and not to mention the British Open).
