GCSE Students Attend Puccini's *Tosca* at Shrewsbury Abbey

In September, our GCSE Music students attended a live performance of Puccini's *Tosca*, presented by the **North Wales Opera Company** at the historic Shrewsbury Abbey. The trip offered an inspiring opportunity to experience a professional opera performance in a truly atmospheric setting.

Tosca, set in Rome, is one of Puccini's most dramatic and emotionally charged works. The visit supported students' studies by giving them the chance to experience the power of live orchestral and vocal music, and to reflect on how composers use sound to convey character, mood, and tension.

Although visibility in the Abbey was limited, students were able to appreciate the remarkable acoustics and the intensity of the live performance. The evening provided valuable insight into the world of professional music making and the unique demands of operatic performance.




I am reminded of my oldest Year 11 Leaver Librarian who celebrated her 30th birthday this month. Harry Potter was one of her 'go-to' books.

Continuing to reminisce, 'back in the day' Year 9s reading tastes included:












Historically, the majority of our pupils switch off to reading at the beginning of Year 9 (why?). You can see why 2026 has been designated THE NATIONAL YEAR OF LITERACY. This is a UK-wide campaign led by the Department for Education in partnership with the National Literacy Trust. The aim is 'to tackle the sharp decline in reading for pleasure among children, young people and adults, and transform the Nation's reading culture'. Lofty ambitions indeed!

The Government has set aside £5million for the establishment and development of Secondary School Libraries and I am excited to see how this will impact on our Library. It must be pointed out here that, thanks to the 'forward-thinking' of our Senior Leadership Team, ours is one of only a handful of School Libraries across the country to have had their Budget increased for 2025-26. Pupils are enjoying the steady flow of gorgeous new books designed to retain and promote their interest in reading.

Similarly, massive thanks here to our supportive parents and pupils who have donated some fantastic books to our Library in response to my last newsletter appeal.










Maths in Action Trip





Maths in Action Trip

GCSE Maths in Action

On 12th November, I was able to visit the University of Warwick and listen to 5 fascinating speakers discuss how maths intertwines with the world we live in. Maths seeps into every job, every activity, every single day; sometimes it is just hard to realise. These intelligent speakers introduced engaging talks to allow us to understand the importance of maths in the world we currently live in.

To begin the day, Kit explored how humans often expect things to happen in a linear, predictable pattern and how easily we assume things to make solving problems less complicated. Reality argues that, due to how random the world is that we live in, it is smarter to second-guess linear patterns than to disregard our lack of addressing real probability and our understanding of non-linearity. Kit Yates demonstrated multiple scenarios to clarify how to problem-solve and make informed decisions correctly.

Sophie Maclean taught us how colour is such a special addition to maths. Although it can be seen as such a simple idea, colour forms such extra opportunities in the subject. Colours can help our brains quickly and easily visualise solutions to problems. We were shown how colours can help us when redecorating a house and where countries connect or border. Sophie introduced an idea that seems so simple but has a large intelligence behind it.

Daren Macay used maths to allow us to understand the importance of using data in the real world and how we can thoroughly understand it. He taught us how we can use data to tackle climate change and where it is at its greatest risk. Daren was interesting and interactive with his approach to maths and is currently trying to use his passion to help assist the world's crisis.

Zoe Griffiths' talk was pleasantly surprising, as we had no idea that maths could be used to perform magic tricks. Zoe was very interactive and eventually explained how maths is the root of all magic she does. She linked it to the idea that, like magic, when we first look at a maths problem, it looks impossible; however, as we start to break it down, it begins to piece together and eventually is solved. Zoe was a fascinating speaker and had very entertaining tricks.

Finally, Colin Wright unexpectedly told us how much he uses maths to improve his juggling. Colin says he uses specific maths patterns to time how long the ball is in the air for and what tricks he can perform until the ball reaches his hand again. He was easy to follow and caused a lot of excitement for us all to watch. I would want to see him in the future, creating more interesting patterns.

My Maths in Action experience was lovely. I would recommend this trip to anyone who has the opportunity to go. Although maths can be frustrating, this trip's main focus was to help us understand the positives of being able to find maths in anything and always seek to use our understanding of maths in anything.


GCHQ

Design and Technology

Year 7 have made a fantastic start to the term developing their woodworking skills in creating a wooden truck. Their confidence with tools and equipment is growing every lesson.

Year 8 have been making a bottle opener or Bluetooth speaker looking at topics such as ergonomics and modelling. Their independence has been phenomenal this term! These project will continue after Christmas.

Year 9 have been showing skills in metal work and CAD to create a pewter cast key tag. Some pupils are also in the middle of manufacturing a desktop lamp showing lots of creativity.

Year 10 have started the Construction course learning about performance requirements of buildings, drawing skills and practical joinery skills. GCSE DT pupils have been working on a modelling project around cameras which will be a key element of their coursework next year.

Year 11 are deep into their NEA in GCSE DT and are almost ready to make their final product after Christmas. The Construction pupils have completed their final coursework element which is 60% of the course complete!

Appearance: Bright yellow-green with tufts (or "tussocks") of hair, often with a bright tail-like spike at the end—very distinctive!

Habitat: Common in gardens, woodland edges, hedgerows, and parks.

Season: Most often seen as caterpillars in **late summer to early autumn** (e.g., August–October), before they pupate and emerge as adult moths the following year.

Distribution: Widespread across **southern and central UK**, and much of **Europe**.

□ Is it unusual to see one?

While not rare, they are **eye-catching**, so many people think they're exotic or uncommon. You may not see them often unless you're actively looking in the right places during the right time of year.

☐ A Note on Handling:

They may cause skin irritation if touched, due to the hairs, so it's best

to admire them without handling.

Some reindeer herds, also known as caribou, can number as many as 50,000 animals.

Pupils were exceptionally respectful throughout the visit and made a wonderful impression on our visitors, who were delighted by the warm hospitality they received. Despite the cold weather, spirits remained high, helped by the CFA who kindly provided and sold refreshments at break and lunchtime to keep everyone going.

- If necessary, transport will be dispatched early and you will notified by text message and email.

- If there is more widespread severe weather, Shropshire Council Authority will activate a Helpline for parents. (When operating, the helpline number will be given out by the Radio Stations)
